HST - NEW ROUTES APPROVED

The Transport Secretary, William Rodgers recently announced that he had approved a proposal for a major investment scheme to introduce high speed trains on services linking Edinburgh and North-East England with the South-West and South Wales. This means construction of 18 high speed trains together with spares and necessary improvements to track and signalling at a total cost of over £45m.The new trains will be progressively Introduced into service from 1981cutting journey times from, Newcastle-Cardiff by 64 minutes and Edinburgh-Plymouth by 126 minutes.

RAIL COSTS

In 1977 BRB spent in England and Wales $\pm 15,100$ per single track mile on infrastructure work on track signalling and electric track equipment, In Scotland the cost was $\pm 13,700$ a mile. This excludes capital expenditure not allocated to a single region.

MILTON KEYNES TO HAVE NEW CENTRAL STATION

BR are to build a new Inter-City station at Central Milton Keynes on a site between Bletchley and Wolverton stations. Construction will begin at the end of 1979 and the station will be in operation by May 1981. The new station on the London-Birmingham-Glasgow electrified route will become the terminal for Euston's Outer Suburban services. A pattern of Inter-City trains will also call at the new station,

TRAGEDY AT TAUNTON

At 03-00 on Thursday 6th.July fire broke out on the previous night's 21-30 Penzance-Paddington sleeper near Taunton, resulting in the loss of eleven lives, A further passenger has since died in hospital. The last passenger death resulting from a train accident was in October 1975 when a light engine collided with an Aberdeen-Kings Cross train at Lunan Bay, between Montrose and Arbroath.

DERAILMENT AT HOUGHTON

On 19th.June the 14-36 Paignton-Leeds struck a derailed freight train at Houghton Colliery, north of Rotherham, resulting in the front bogies of the locomotive being derailed and damage to each of the coaches, which were also struck by wagons. Miraculously no-one was seriously injured.

TORY DIP RAIL

Debate on rail catering arose recently in the House of Commons under a "Ten Minute Rule Bill" proposed by Conservative DIP for Pudsey Giles Shaw. The purpose of Mr. Shaw's Bill was 'to allow private franchising arrangements for rail catering both on stations and on trains. NUR MP Dick Buchanan defended rail catering and suggested that Sir Charles Forte the was the only one who might take on rail catering (he is one of the top ten contributors to Tory party -funds). Mr. Buchanan praised the staff of Travellers Fare and indicated he would not be prepared to eat or drink should conditions in station buffets or on trains deteriorate to a level commonly found in Sir Charles' motorway cafes. The Bill was defeated by 164 to 135 votes.

PLEASURE BOAT ON STANDBY

BR have announced that should the 'FARRINGFORD', the only boat now working the Humber Ferry-service, break down, then the Bridlington pleasure boat 'YORKSHIRE BELLE' would be brought into use as a replacement even though this vessel has no capacity for road vehicles.

HIGHEST BOX CLOSURE

The highest signal box on BR at Dalnaspidal in the Scottish Highlands, has been closed. The box 1,400 feet above sea level has been made redundant with the opening of the new double line stretch between Blair Atholl and Dalwhinnie.

STEELMEN's NEW STATION

A new railway station for British Steel employees at Redcar on Teesside has been opened. The new station has been called British Steel, Redcar - replaces the old Warrenby Halt and is on the from Darlington to Saltburn. Also a new line is being laid to carry torpedo ladles of molten iron from the giant furnace now being. built at Redcar to BSC's Lackenby Plant. Lackenby plant.

GRANT FOR RAILFREIGHT

The Transport Secretary is to Grant £683,000 to Blue Circle Cement towards the £1.5m cost of providing rail freight facilities at a new bulk cement depot at Upperby Sidings, Carlisle. This will secure on rail the future bulk supplies of cement from Eastgate Weardale, and Hope, Derbyshire. The grant is the second largest to be agreed in England.

MORE HST's ON ECML

Three more weekday services on the high-speed services on the East Coast Main Line have recently been introduced. The 08-00 Kings Cross/Edinburgh, 13-10 Edinburgh/Kings Cross, 15-10 Edinburgh/Kings Cross and 19-01 Kings Cross/Newcastle.

The down Newcastle Executive departing London at 17-55 will become an HST working and be speeded up.

BR are gradually a, face lift to their diesel multiple unit fleet and. the first refurbished train to be introduced in the West of England Division has entered service on the Stroud Valley line between Swindon, Gloucester and Cheltenham. Five DMUs in total will be refurbished for use on the line. Cost of one three-car set is £21,000

HEAVY WORK TO TAKE PLACE ON ECML

Heavy engineering work is to take place shortly at Stoke and Peascliffe tunnels in the vicinity of Grantham and Penmanshiel Tunnel in Scotland to give throughout route availability for 8,611 containers, and it has been decided that the work should be carried out before full implementation of' the Inter-City 125 timetable in 1979. It is proposed that the work in Stoke and Peascliffe Tunnels should be undertaken between September and December this year with the work in Penmanshiel Tunnel following on in January to March 1979,

All tracks through Stoke and Peascliffe tunnels will be lowered by approximately one foot. This will be done one line at a time and will require a continuous block for the line affected plus opposite line block on weekday nights for three weeks. Stoke Down Line will be blocked Monday 11th. September until Saturday 30th September, Stoke Up Line from Monday 2nd.October until Saturday 21st, October. Peascliffe Down Line will be blocked from Monday 23rd.October until Saturday 11th, November whilst Peascliffe Up Line will be blocked from Monday 13th. November until Saturday 2nd.December.

The Engineer will be given 12 hours total possession overnight Monday/Tuesday to Friday/Saturday, and single line working will apply during the remaining period. Total possession will commence at 20.30 finishing it 08.00. During this time all overnight services will be diverted via the Joint Line with connecting DMU services to and from Grantham, Newark and Retford, as appropriate from Sleaford, Doncaster, Lincoln and Peterborough. Diversions via Cambridge or Lincoln will also take place on Saturday nights/Sunday mornings and up to Sunday afternoons.

TRAGEDY AT SHEFFIELD

A railman was killed when hit by a Carlisle-Nottingham express hauled by 45145 near Attercliffe Road station on 21st.August. Following trains were diverted via Tinsley Yard and Canklow.

ZOO TRAIN DERAILMENT

Six passengers, including two children were taken to Scarborough Hospital on 20th.August after being, flung from a miniature train which crashed during a trip round the Zoo. Several other people were injured when two open carriages on the train left the half-mile track at Flamingo Park zoo at Kirkby Misperton.

DONCASTER MERRYMAKER TROUBLE

Soon after the tragic excursion from Scunthorpe to Windsor which arrived back over 160 minutes late further trouble hit a Doncaster Division excursion on 3rd June. The excursion, from Spalding to Fort William was hauled by 47218 to Eastfield where 25062/230 took over. 25230 expired at Dumbarton necessitating a further brace of engines to be dispatched from Eastfield in the shape of 25246 and 27029. However 25246 failed at Crianlarich and was replaced by 25232. Arrival at Fort William was 139 minutes late.

To rub salt into the wounds 25232 died at Corrour on the return journey and was detached leaving 27029 to struggle alone to Bridge of Orchy where 27043 was attached to assist to Eastfield. Almost unbelievably the official reason for all this trouble was hot weather.
